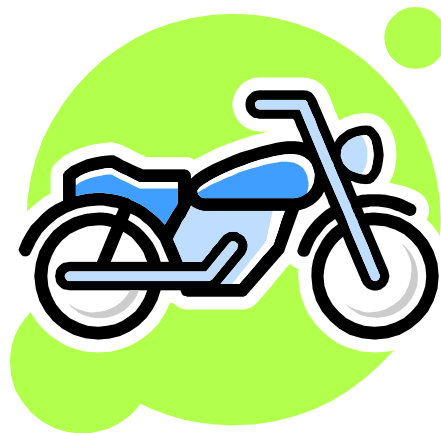

Under 17 Car Club

As some of you know, I am very keen that youngsters should be encouraged to take their Advanced Driving Test after they have passed their standard driving test. I discovered the Under 17 Car Club by accident four years ago, unfortunately too late for my son Thomas, who was then sixteen. They start driving at the age of thirteen in their parent's cars, at Castle Combe and at other venues where they can.

This year I managed to be invited to go along to the Castle Combe track with other members of our group to see what they did and how. Hopefully you will have read the reports in the newsletters this year. Since my first visit I have been to every meeting this year and am very impressed. The tuition given includes speed awareness, first aid, theory, the Highway Code and, last but not least, they have to know what is under the bonnet and how it works!

I am always amazed at how confident the youngsters are, how disciplined and how much they protect their activity, in so much as if anyone sees someone driving irresponsibly, they are all called in from the track and the matter is discussed and sorted. Not only are Wiltshire Police involved but other Police Forces are taking an interest.

In September I was approached by one of their Committee for my views on taking the youngsters on after they pass their 'L' test at seventeen, to take them to do their RoSPA Advanced Test. **Excited! I was over the moon!** This is just what I have been hoping for. At seventeen the youngsters are sort of cast aside, as they

can no longer drive with the club unless they continue as marshals, which many of them do.

It has obviously got to be discussed by all concerned, but I am hopeful that we can move this forward.

I joined the group, not only because I thought I was quite a good, considerate driver, and to prove to myself I could do it, but also to encourage others to improve their driving. If we can get 17/18 year olds to take the Advanced test, then it is a start, and hopefully they will continue to be retested every three years. Yes, I know some will fall by the wayside but we have to, as an organisation, start somewhere. The government will not do a lot except find new ways of trying to slow traffic down, and certainly I see no signs of them helping to continue to educate motorists. It will mean giving up some time on a Sunday, not every Sunday, and they will probably not need many drives since the ex-Under 17 Car Club members that have taken their RoSPA test already have all passed gaining Gold.

Now I want your help! There are one or two people interested in becoming an instructor for the Under 17 Car Club, but as a group we will need Tutors to help get them through their Advanced Test. We are going to run a new Tutors course shortly, so **please** give it some, no, a lot of thought!

September's Meeting Report – Roger Blythin, Wiltshire Police

Roger Blythin of Wiltshire Police, who spoke on how and why the police investigate fatal road incidents, got a full and enthusiastic audience for the group's first autumn meeting.

He started off by explaining the purpose of these inquiries which is not just to get someone to court (in fact that's quite a low priority) but to try to find the reasons for the incident. Each fatal crash brings with it family tragedy but also an average cost of £1.6 million so the total cost of our annual 3,500 road deaths is more than £5.5 billion. That's a big incentive to cut them by finding out their causes. There's very rarely just one reason for an incident - always two or more. Speed is an important factor in most; driver error, and road layouts too. Plain stupidity sometimes; he showed us a video of rubberneckers running into each other as they slowed down to look at a motorway accident on the opposite carriageway.

Roger explained why an accident investigation can easily take a year to sort out, even though the causes may seem quite simple to the average man sitting in his car. Witnesses don't always get it right. An examination of the scene and the vehicles may tell a different story. He had one case where the witnesses all said they saw a car overtaking. None did. The car was a foreign driver on the wrong side of the road.

He talked about the priorities at the scene. Make the situation safe, then attend to casualties or the first accident may be followed by a second with even more injuries - this nearly happened to him at the

first incident he attended. Sometimes roads must be closed to preserve what is in effect a crime scene for a more detailed examination. Responsibilities are divided up. One officer is in overall charge. Another looks at the physical situation, skid marks on road, position of vehicles and casualties etc. Another interviews witnesses who may tell a different story or may be lying. Another checks for vehicle defects so that when a driver says his brakes suddenly failed he can be proved right or wrong. And finally, and introduced recently, there is a family liaison officer whose job is to help the family, including breaking the news of a death, who may come to the accident scene as well.

Roger showed us a DVD of a fictitious fatal incident made by an army officer who had been the driver when three of his passengers were killed. It affected him so much that he became a campaigner for safer driving. The DVD showed how complicated the tasks of the police, paramedics and fire brigade are at an incident and how they work together; the firemen cut apart a car to get at the injured while the paramedics try to keep them alive.

Roger's talk led to lots of questions. We discussed the causes of accidents, dodderly old drivers (do you make them have retests and how do you do so), young drivers (should the starting age limit be raised), should people drive other types of vehicles (so that car drivers, for instance, would realise how difficult it is to drive an HGV), and should people be shown horrific pictures of accidents to make them drive better. No, said our speaker, it just puts them off but doesn't improve their driving.

Finally our chairman, pretty well recovered from his own recent incident, thanked Roger and brought a lively and interesting evening to a close.

If you have had a new photo driving licence for 10 years it must be renewed, and I have heard that renewal notices are not always sent out. Fine £1000!



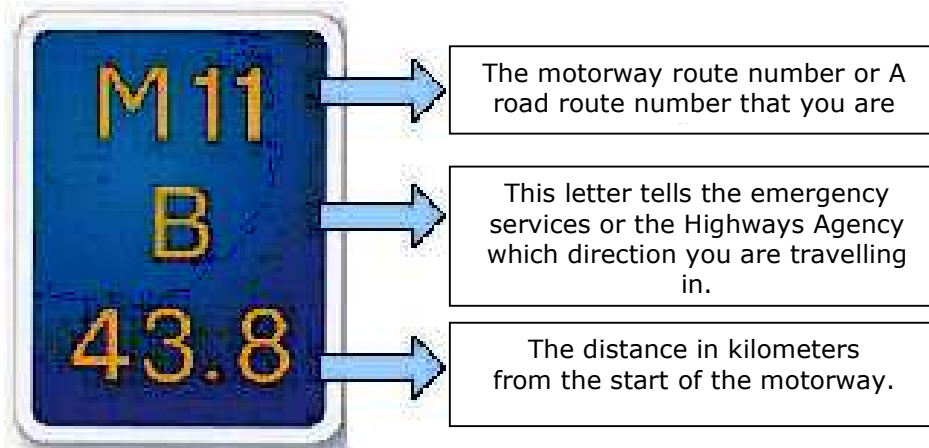

New Traffic Information Sign: Driver Location Sign

What is a driver location sign?

A sign by the side of a motorway or all-purpose trunk road that tells you:



What do I use the sign for?

If you witness an incident such as a road traffic collision or debris on the road, tell the emergency services or Highways Agency what is written on the nearest sign to you (remember, it is illegal to use a mobile phone when driving, use a hands free kit, or ask a passenger to use a mobile). This will help the emergency services to get to the correct location quickly.

To Report:

Road Traffic Incidents / Collisions - dial 999 or 112

Debris - call Highways Agency Information Line 08457 50 40 30
